
Monsters, Movies & Mayhem

Presenting more than 100 recipes from 69 chefs, restaurants, and producers in Colorado's Roaring Fork Valley, *The Aspen Cookbook* shares the stories behind beloved dishes created and tested for cooking at altitude. Featuring illustrations by Julia Bridgforth and a foreword by Food & Wine editor-inchief Hunter Lewis, *The Aspen Cookbook* was produced as a community fundraiser for restaurants strained by the 2020 coronavirus pandemic.

Julia Bridgforth learned the importance of food in community creation and empowerment while studying food systems in Tanzania, Guatemala, and the U.S. during her master's program at Vanderbilt University. An illustrator and designer for play and a public relations professional for work, Julia strives to use the power of story and the industry of food to enact good.

Award-winning Aspen Times Weekly food columnist and magazine journalist Amanda Rae Busch was trained as a recipe editor/tester while interning at BBC Good Food in London. She's served as senior editor of Berkshire Living magazine, copy editor of culture: the word on cheese, and contributing editor to Aspen Sojourner. *The Aspen Cookbook* is her first cookbook.



The American West in Art

The American West in Art: Selections from the Denver Art Museum showcases the collection of the Petrie Institute of Western American Art. A prologue by Dan Flores and an epilogue by Erika Doss frame 22 essays, leading readers through the history of western American Art from the 1800s to the 1940s, with historical and contemporary perspectives.

Jennifer "J.R." Henneman, Ph.D., is the Associate Curator of Western American Art at the Denver Art Museum. She co-curated Backstory: Western American Art in Context in collaboration with History Colorado as well as Natural Forces: Winslow Homer and Frederic Remington (2020).

Thomas Brent Smith is the director of the Petrie Institute of Western American Art and Curator of Western American Art at the Denver Art Museum. His many curated shows include the groundbreaking The American West in Bronze (2013) with the Metropolitan Museum of Art and The Western: An Epic in Art and Film (2017) with the Montreal Museum of Fine Art.



Chicana Activists of Colorado: Powerful Women Paper Dolls and Their Stories

This cleverly designed portfolio of stacked pages features the stories of 29 Colorado Chicana women as paper dolls. They were women who fought for their place in the American system and laid the pathway for others. According to Martinez Martinez, "This book is a way to honor these women, their families and their communities."

Deborah Martinez Martinez earned a Ph.D. in educational leadership in 2001 while serving the community. After 18 years at Colorado State University at Pueblo, she was an historical interpreter at El Pueblo History Museum, conducting natural dye workshops throughout Colorado and New Mexico. She and her partner, Robert Pacheco, have published 11 books including *Trade on the Taos Mountain Trail*. a Colorado Book Awards finalist.

Robert W. Pacheco, illustrator, has 14 years of experience as a graphic designer for Estes Rockets, an international toy company. He taught commercial art and drawing classes at the university level. Robert does graphic design, illustration, and painting from his studio in Pueblo, Colorado, capturing his New Mexico roots.


I Will Dance

Vivian Mineker is a Taiwanese American illustrator from Taipei and Portland, Oregon, currently working out of Ljubljana, Slovenia. She captures inspirations from her surroundings in watercolor and colored pencils, then digitally polishes them to blend traditional texture with a modern look and feel.


When You Know What I Know

No Option But North: The Migrant World and the Perilous Path Across the Border

Journalist Kelsey Freeman interweaves Central American and Mexican migrants' stories with research and anecdotes collected over nine months to reveal the fundamental moral quandaries of contemporary migration—from expanding gang violence to the dearth of legal options on both sides of the border, and more. In the process, Freeman takes us on a harrowing journey that strikes at the heart of the human ability to endure.

As a writer and educator, Kelsey Freeman focuses on immigration policy, Indigenous rights, social justice, and public policy. After graduating from Bowdoin College, she received a Fulbright Fellowship to teach English and study migration in central Mexico. She currently runs a college-readiness program for Native American high school students through Central Oregon Community College.

Tess Freeman is a freelance documentary photographer and videographer based in Bend, Oregon. She has worked as a multimedia journalist for newspapers in Oregon, Texas, and Idaho. Her passion for human interest stories led her to join her sister, Kelsey, in Mexico to photograph for *No Option but North*.

A graduate of the S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications at Syracuse University, Johanna Garton also has a law degree from DePaul University College of Law. Several years of living and working in Asia inspired her to write her first book, *Awakening East*. She lives in Denver.



Bridging Worlds: A Sherpa's Story

Pemba Sherpa and co-author James McVey take readers on Pemba's life journey from a poor, remote Nepalese village in the Khumbu, to accomplished mountaineer, expedition leader, and successful US businessman, and back to Khumbu to build a bridge and hydroelectric power plant, and bring hundreds of thousands of dollars in earthquake relief to his native people.

Born in the remote Khumbu region of Nepal, Pemba Sherpa distinguished himself as a mountain guide before migrating to Boulder at 19. He founded Ascent International and is the owner of Sherpa Chai Tea Company and Sherpa's Adventurer Restaurant in Boulder. As a result of his success in business, Pemba has helped Nepalese build a bridge and a hydroelectric plant, and is planning a medical clinic. He has led more than 20 trips to Nepal for the Colorado Mountain Club.

James McVey is a professor emeritus of the University of Colorado and the author of four books, including *The Way Home: Essays on the Outside West* and *The Wild Upriver and Other Stories*.

Pat Melgares, born in Alamosa, Colorado, was a four-time NAIA All-American in cross country and track and field. Pat studied journalism at Adams State College and was editor of the Alamosa Valley Courier and public information officer at Adams State. Since 1998, he has been a communications specialist and public information officer at Kansas State University.



Heartbreak Kennel: The True Story of Max and His Breeder

Nearly 100 Labrador retrievers are discovered one hot summer day in a rural Colorado field, abandoned by Dodie Cariaso, a college-educated woman from an upper middle-class Midwestern family. What drove this tragedy? Former journalist and prosecutor Cary Unkelbach unfolds a riveting account of how Dodie's early success as a potter devolves into unimaginable neglect.

Cary Unkelbach grew up in a family that bred, raised, trained, and showed their Walden Labrador retrievers for more than forty years. She has worked as a newspaper reporter, prosecutor, and civil litigator, and has written articles for various publications. Cary lives in the central Colorado mountains.



The Scholar and the Struggle: Lawrence Reddick's Crusade for Black History and Black Power

David A. Varel

Lawrence Reddick, among the most notable intellectuals and activists of his generation, forcefully confronted institutional racism within academia during the Black Power era. Varel's biography reveals the many essential but underappreciated roles played by intellectuals in the black freedom struggle and connects the past to the present in powerful, unforgettable ways.

David A. Varel is an adjunct professor of history at the Metropolitan State University of Denver. He earned his Ph.D. in history from the University of Colorado-Boulder, and he is also the author of *The Lost Black Scholar: Resurrecting Allison Davis in American Social Thought* (University of Chicago Press, 2018).



Yanks Behind the Lines: How the Commission for Relief in Belgium Saved Millions from Starvation during World War I

During World War I, the nongovernmental US-led Commission for Relief in Belgium saved nearly ten million civilians from starvation, becoming the largest food relief program ever seen. Miller interweaves history with personal stories of volunteers, diplomats, a Belgian woman who started a dairy farm to feed Antwerp's children, the autocratic head of the Belgian relief organization, and the founder of the American organization, Herbert Hoover.

Over the course of his long career as a writer, magazine editor, and historian, Jeffrey B. Miller has started six magazines. He is the author of *Stapleton International Airport: The First Fifty Years* and the co-author of *Facing Your Fifties: Every Man's Reference to Mid-life Health*. His books *Behind the Lines* (2014) and *WWI Crusaders* (2018) were named Kirkus Best Books of the Year.



Colorado's Highest: The History of Naming the 14,000-Foot Peaks

Written by Jeri L. Norgren with photographs by John Fielder John Fielder Publishing

Through extensive research of the early Colorado mining days, Norgren's essays pair with John Fielder's photographs of the fourteeners (many never before published), Robert L. Wogrin's sublime oil paintings and sketches, and historical sketches from the 1870s by artists of the Hayden Survey to make a classic Colorado history book.

Jeri L. Norgren has spent most of her life exploring Colorado's mountains. As a member of the Denver Fortnightly Club, she has authored numerous papers on various topics, including the one that grew into this book.

Three-time winner of a Colorado Book Award, John Fielder is an American landscape photographer, nature writer, publisher, and conservationist. He is known for his landscape photography, scenic calendars, and numerous coffee table books and travel guides.

The Bad Old Days of Colorado: Untold Stories of the Wild West

Coloradans relish just how "bad" things used to be: the terrain, the inhabitants, and especially the quality of whiskey. While fearless lawmen, industrious entrepreneurs and resilient miners and ranchers were the backbone of society, its underbelly teemed with gambling "hells," seedy brothels, and shady characters who rarely did an honest day's work.

Randi Samuelson-Brown is the author of *The Beaten Territory*, an historical fiction novel. Originally from Golden, she now lives in Denver.



This year we are delighted to honor Charles F. Wilkinson with the Colorado Book Awards Lifetime Achievement Award for his contributions to the Colorado and national literary, history, and legal communities. Writer, advocate, and distinguished university professor emeritus, Wilkinson is the author of numerous articles, chapters, and books, including Messages from Frank's Landing and Blood Struggle—the Rise of Modern Indian Nations, winners of the 2000 and 2006 Colorado Book Awards respectively for History.

Charles earned his law degree from Stanford University in 1966. He moved to Colorado in 1971 to help found and serve as a Staff Attorney for the Native America Rights Fund and began teaching at University of Colorado in 1984, becoming the Moses Lasky Professor of Law in 1989. In 1997, he was named by the Regents of the University of Colorado a Distinguished Professor. In his over 32 continuous years at Colorado Law, Charles has become one of the most widely celebrated names in not only American Indian law, but also in the history of the American West, public land law, water law, and environmental law—even being labeled by Outside Magazine as "the West's leading authority on natural resource law."




